## DESCRIPTION OF HOUSE VOTES



1. HR 1828 Syria Accountability Act. Ros-Lehtinen (R-FL) motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill that would require the President to impose sanctions on Syria. Any of the sanctions could be waived for national security reasons. The bill would also condemn Syrian involvement with terrorism and demand a withdrawal of Syrian forces from Lebanon. Motion agreed to 408-8; 11/20/03. (A 2/3 majority of those present and voting is required for passage under suspension of the rules). Signed into law 12/12/03. This measure, which received overwhelming support, requires that Syria be held accountable for policies that are hostile to U.S. interests in the region.
2. HR 2800 Foreign Operations Appropriations. Bill to appropriate $\$ 17.2$ billion in FY 2004 for foreign operations, export financing and related programs, $\$ 927$ million more than the FY 2003 bill. Passed $370-50 ; 7 / 23 / 03$. Signed into law as HR 2673 Consolidated Appropriations Bill 1/23/04. Included is $\$ 2$ billion in funding to combat HIV/AIDS in Africa, $\$ 1$ billion less than was already authorized by Congress. Israel and Egypt, in line with a 1990s agreement, receive what the President requested. Aid to Israel is \$2.2 billion military and $\$ 480$ million economic; aid to Egypt is $\$ 1.3$ billion military and $\$ 575$ million economic.
3. HR 2210 Head Start Reauthorization. Bill that would authorize the Head Start program through 2008. It would establish a pilot program to allow eight states to coordinate their state preschool programs with Head Start centers. Religious organizations operating Head Start programs would be allowed to consider religion as a factor in hiring. Passed 217-216; 7/24/03. This bill would permit discrimination on the basis of religion in hiring. It would arguably compromise the historic effectiveness of Head Start by implementing a pilot program allowing 8 states to manage Head Start programs without requiring that they meet Head Start's performance standards.
4. HR 2799 FY 2004 Commerce, Justice, State Appropriations/Ten Commandments. Hostetter (R-IN) amendment that would bar the Justice Department from enforcing the ruling of the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals requiring the Ten Commandments monument to be removed from the Alabama State Supreme Court Building. Adopted $260-161 ; 7 / 23 / 03$. A "no" is a vote in favor of separation of religion and state. This provision was subsequently removed from the final bill.
5. HR 2765 FY 2004 DC Appropriations/ School Vouchers. Davis (Tom Davis, R-VA) amendment to authorize a school voucher program in
the District of Columbia. Certain low-income students would be eligible for up to $\$ 7,500$ in funds to attend a private (including parochial) elementary or high school in DC. Adopted 209-208; 9/9/03. Signed into law as HR 2673 Consolidated Appropriations Bill 1/23/04. Arguably, this measure compromises the Constitutional separation between religion and state and diverts funds to a program that will help only a few students, leaving the vast majority behind.
6. HR 7 Charitable Giving/Democratic Substitute. Cardin (D.MD) amendment to the bill to provide tax incentives, such as non-itemizer deduction and IRA rollover, for charitable contributions. This amendment would increase funding for social services block grants by $\$ 1.1$ billion in fiscal 2004, paid for by reducing corporate tax breaks. Rejected 203-220; 9/17/03. Jewish federations and other charitable organizations lobbied for this amendment, which failed. The underlying bill retains the support of philanthropic organizations because it will boost charitable giving.
7. HR 1 Medicare Prescription Drug Benefit/Conference Report. Bill to create a prescription drug benefit for Medicare recipients beginning in 2006, and provide coverage through traditional Medicare or a private health plan. Adopted 220-215; 11/22/03. Signed into law 12/8/03.
Supporters say this is a much needed reform that will strengthen Medicare in anticipation of baby boomers who will begin collecting benefits in 2010. Opponents say it does far more for the insurance and pharmaceutical industries than for seniors, it creates a two-tier system, one for the healthy or wealthy, the other for the unhealthy or poor, and the drug benefit is inadequate.
8. HR 1950 State Department Authorization/UN Population Fund. Smith (R-N) amendment to strike a provision that would ease restrictions on US contributions to the UN Population Fund. Adopted 216-211; 7/15/03. A "yes" is a vote to restrict funds for UN family planning services. A "no" is a pro-choice vote.
9. S 3 Partial Birth Abortion Ban/Conference Report. Bill to ban a medical procedure opponents refer to as "partial birth" abortion. The procedure would be allowed only if it is necessary to save a woman's life. Passed 281-142; 10/2/03. Signed into law 11/5/03. This is the first stand-alone measure restricting an abortion procedure since the Roe v. Wade decision. It contains no health exception. It faces multiple court challenges.

1. HR 1828 Syria Accountability Act. Bill to require the President to impose sanctions on Syria. Any of the sanctions could be waived for national security reasons. The bill also condemns Syrian involvement with terrorism and demands a withdrawal of Syrian forces from Lebanon. Passed 89-4; 11/11/03. Signed into law 12/12/03. This bill requires that Syria be held accountable for policies that are hostile to U.S. interests in the region.
2. S 1689 FY 2004 Supplemental for Iraq and Afghanistan/ Congressional Approval. Stevens (R-AK) motion to table the Byrd (D-WV) amendment against allowing the President to reallocate funds for the reconstruction of Iraq. The Byrd amendment would instead require the President to use the appropriations process. Motion agreed to 49-46; 10/17/03. At issue is who decides, the President or Congress, how money will be allocated for reconstruction of Iraq. The President's position prevailed.
3. S 14 Energy Policy/Fuel Economy Standards. Durbin (D-IL) amendment that would mandate an increase in Corporate Average Fuel Economy (CAFE) standards. Passenger vehicles made before 2006 would be required to average 25 MPG , non-passenger vehicles 17 MPG . After that, the standard would gradually increase. Rejected 32-65; 7/29/03. This measure, which failed, was an attempt to reduce pollution and dependence on oil by raising the vehicle mileage-per-gallon of new cars and light trucks. A "yes" is a pro-environment vote.
4. HR 2660 FY 2004 Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations/ Head Start. Dodd (D-CT) motion that would have the effect of increasing funding to Head Start programs by $\$ 350$ million. ( $3 / 5$ of the total Senate, 60 , is required to pass this procedural motion). Motion rejected 47-47; 9/9/03. This motion, which failed, called for an increase in Head Start funding.
5. Pickering Nomination/Cloture. Motion to invoke cloture (thus limiting debate) on President Bush's nomination of Charles W. Pickering, Sr. to be a judge for the US Court of Appeals. (3/5 of the total Senate, 60 , is required to invoke cloture.) Motion rejected $54-43 ; 10 / 30 / 03$. This motion, which failed, was an attempt by Pickering supporters to end the filibuster against his nomination. Judge Pickering took actions from the bench that arguably violated the Judicial Code of Ethics when he tried
to force prosecutors to reduce the sentence of a man convicted of cross burning. These and other actions prompted opponents to filibuster his confirmation. Subsequently, the President installed Pickering in a recess appointment, which does not require Senate confirmation and is valid until the next Congress takes office (January, 2005).
6. S 1053 Genetic Nondiscrimination. Bill that would ban employers and health insurers from discriminating based on an individual's genetic profile. Passed $95-0 ; 10 / 14 / 03$. This bill creates new protections against discrimination by employers and insurance companies. No action has been taken in the House.
7. HR 1 Medicare Prescription Drug Benefit/Conference Report. Bill to create a prescription drug benefit for Medicare recipients beginning in 2006, and provide coverage through traditional Medicare or a private health plan. Passed 54-44; 11/25/03. Signed into law 12/8/03.
Supporters say this is a much needed reform that will strengthen Medicare in anticipation of baby boomers who will begin collecting benefits in 2010. Opponents say it does far more for the insurance and pharmaceutical industries than for seniors, it creates a two-tier system, one for the healthy or wealthy, the other for the unhealthy or poor, and the drug benefit is inadequate.
8. S 925 FY 2004 State Department Reauthorization/ Mexico City policy. Lugar (R-IN) motion to table the Boxer (D-CA) amendment to the Lugar subssitute. The Boxer amendment would repeal the "Mexico City" policy, which forbids foreign organizations that receive U.S. aid from providing abortions or abortion counseling. Rejected 43-53; 7/9/03. (The Boxer amendment was later adopted by voice vote.) A "no" is a pro-choice vote. The Boxer amendment was subsequently removed from the final bill in response to a veto threat from President Bush.
9. S 3 Partial Birth Abortion Ban/Conference Report. Bill to ban a medical procedure opponents refer to as "partial birth" abortion. The procedure would be allowed only if necessary to save a woman's life. Adopted 64-34; 10/21/03. Signed into law $11 / 5 / 03$. This is the first stand-alone measure restricting an abortion procedure since the Roe v. Wade decision. It contains no health exception. It faces multiple court challenges.
