1. H J RES 124 FY 2003 Continuing Appropriations. Joint resolution to provide continuing appropriations through January 11, 2003, for all federal departments and programs not covered by enacted FY 2003 spending bills. The resolution would set spending at FY 2002 levels, including FY 2002 supplemental appropriations. Passed 270-143; 11/13/02. The House passed this resolution as a temporary measure to keep government spending at last year's levels. Not included was a promised additional $\mathbf{\$ 2 0 0}$ million in anti-terrorism aid for Israel. In the meantime, aid to Israel was being apportioned on a pro-rated basis like most other government programs. Signed by the President 11/23/02.
2. HR 5010 FY 2003 Defense Appropriations/Conference Report. Conference report on the bill that would provide $\$ 355.1$ billion for the Defense Department for FY 2003, an increase of \$21 billion over FY 2002 regular and supplemental funds. Adopted 409-14;10/10/02. This bill includes more than $\$ 450$ million in funding for joint U.S.-Israeli strategic programs, including the Arrow missile defense program, the Mobile Tactical High Energy Laser, the Lightning II Targeting Pod, and Bradley Reactive Armor Tiles. Signed into law 10/23/02.
3. HR 5710 Homeland Security Act. Bill that would consolidate 22 agencies into a new Cabinet-level Homeland Security Department charged with protecting domestic security. It would give the President the ability to exempt some employees from collective bargaining units for national security reasons. Passed 299-121; 11/13/02. A "yes" was a vote in support of the President's position. Signed into law 11/25/02.
4. HR 5005 Homeland Security/Union Membership. Amendment (Morella, R-MD) that would give federal employees who transfer into the homeland security department the right to join a union if they were under union protection before the transfer. The President could exempt employees from union membership when duties are directly related to the war on terrorism. Rejected $208-222 ; 7 / 26 / 02$. This measure, which failed, would have extended civil service union protection to many workers in the new homeland security department, thus clarifying the White House opposition to such union protections.
5. H J Res 114 Use of Force. Joint resolution that would authorize the use of force against Iraq and require the administration to report to Congress that diplomatic options have been exhausted. Passed 296-133; 10/10/02. This measure gives President Bush authority to wage
war against Iraq as part of the effort to disarm it, thus endorsing a doctrine of pre-emptive strikes. A "yes" was a vote in support of the President's position. Signed into law 10/16/02.
6. HR 2357 Churches and Campaign Activities. Motion (Herger, R-CA) to suspend the rules and pass the bill to allow a religious organization to carry out political campaign activities and still maintain its 501 (c)(3)tax exempt status so long as such efforts are not a "substantial part" of its work. two-thirds majority of those present and voting (278 in this case) is required for passage under suspension of the rules. Motion rejected 178-239; 10/02/02. This measure, which failed, would arguably compromise the Constitutional separation between religion and state.
7. HR 5203 Education Tax Break. Motion (Hulshof, R-MO) to suspend the rules and pass the bill that would permanently extend a provision in last year's $\$ 1.35$ trillion tax cut package increasing to $\$ 2,000$ the contribution limits for education savings accounts and allowing tax-free withdrawals to pay certain expenses for public, private or religious schools. A two-thirds majority of those present and voting (268 in this case) is required for passage under suspension of the rules. Motion rejected $213-188 ; 9 / 4 / 02$. This measure, which failed, would arguably compromise the Constitutional separation between religion and state.
8. H Res 524 House Support for Estate Tax Repeal. Resolution to express the sense of the House that Congress should pass legislation that would make permanent the estate tax repeal in last year's $\$ 1.35$ trillion tax cut law.Adopted 242 -158; $9 / 19 / 02$. This resolution, which does not have the force of law, sent a message to the Senate that the House favors permanent repeal of the estate tax.
9. HR 4691 Abortion Service Refusals . Bill that would allow hospitals and other health care providers to refuse to perform abortions without fea of penalty. The bill would rewrite a current "conscience clause" that lets physician training programs refuse to provide abortion training. Passed 229-189; 9/25/02. Abortion rights proponents denounced this measure as an effort to limit availability of abortion. Opponents say this is a clarification of existing law.
10. HR 4965 Partial-Birth Abortion Ban. Bill that would ban socalled "partial-birth" abortion. It would allow the procedure only when necessary to save a woman's life. Those who perform the procedure for other reasons would face fines and prison. Passed 274-151; 7/24/02. A "yes" is an anti-choice vote in support of the President's position.

1. H.J. Res 124 Continuing Appropriations for FY 2003. Joint resolution to provide continuing appropriations through January 11, 2003 for all federal departments and programs. Continuing resolution would set spending at 2002 levels. Passed $92-2 ; 11 / 19 / 02$. Unable to agree on an Appropriations package, the Senate passed this resolution as a temporary measure to keep government spending at last year's levels. Not included in this bill was a promised additional $\$ 200$ million in anti-terrorism aid for Israel. Aid to Israel was being apportioned on a pro-rated basis like most other government programs.
2. HR 5010 FY 2003 Defense Appropriations/ Conference Report. Conference report on the bill that would provide $\$ 355.1$ billion for the Defense Department for FY 2003, an increase of $\$ 21$ billion over FY 2002 regular and supplemental funds. Adopted $93-1 ; 10 / 16 / 02$. This bill includes more than $\$ 450$ million in funding for joint U.S.-Israeli strategic programs, including the Arrow missile defense program, the Mobile Tactical High Energy Laser, the Lightning II Targeting Pod, and Bradley Reactive Armor Tiles.
3. HJ Res 114 Use of Force. Joint resolution that would authorize the use of force against Iraq and require the administration to report to Congress that diplomatic options have been exhausted. Passed 77-23; 10/11/02. This measure gives President Bush authority to wage war against Iraq as part of the effort to disarm it, thus endorsing a doctrine of pre-emptive strikes. A "yes" was a vote in support of the President's position. Signed into law 10/16/02.
4. HR 5005 Homeland Security/Cloture. Motion to invoke cloture (thus limiting debate) on the Lieberman (D-CT) substitute amendment that would create a Cabinet-level Homeland Security Department charged with protecting domestic security. Motion rejected $50-49 ; 9 / 26 / 02$. This was a motion to limit debate on a proposal for a new Homeland Security Department that included civil service protections for employees. A "no" was a vote in favor of the President's position.
5. HR 5005 Homeland Security. Bill that would consolidate 22 agencies into a new Cabinet-level Homeland Security Department charged with protecting domestic security. It would give the President the ability to exempt some employees from collective bargaining units for national security reasons. Passed $90-9 ; 11 / 19 / 02$. A "yes" was a vote in support of the President's position. Signed into law 11/25/2002.
6. Shedd Nomination/Confirmation. Confirmation of President Bush's nomination of Dennis W. Shedd of South Carolina to be U.S. Circuit Judge for the 4th Circuit. Confirmed 55-44; 11/19/02. The nomination of Dennis Shedd, who served on the staff of Senator Strom Thurmond (R-SC) from 1978-1988, was opposed by liberal advocacy groups that view his judicial record as anti-civil rights.
7. S 812 Drug Patents/Federal Medical Assistance Percentage. Motion to waive the Budget Act in order to consider an amendment (Rockefeller,WV) that would provide $\$ 9$ billion in temporary financial assistance to states, of which $\$ 6$ billion would be used to increase the Federal Medicaid assistance percentage and bolster state Medicaid programs; $\$ 3$ billion in fiscal relief grants could be used for social service programs. A three-fifths majority of total senate required to waive the budget. Motion agreed to $75-24 ; 7 / 25 / 02$. This measure, part of a larger bill which was never taken up in the House (see vote \#8), had broad support by Jewish and other social service providers hit by state budget shortfalls.
8. S 812 Drug Patents/Prescription Drugs. Motion to waive the Budget Act in order to consider an amendment (Graham, FL) that would provide coverage for Medicare recipients with incomes of up to 200 percent of the poverty level and for drug costs over $\$ 3,300$ for an annual payment of $\$ 25$. It would also allow for consideration of a measure concerning importing of drugs from Canada for personal use. A three-fifths majority of total senate required to waive the budget. Motion rejected 49-50; 7/31/02. This motion, which failed, would have exempted a prescription drug proposal from budgetary requirements, thus killing a bipartisan compromise proposal.
